Borrow Excavation for the construction of a temporary bypass road for the Story Creek Culvert Replacement for Kittitas County, WA, which involves the following:

- Strip & Stockpile existing topsoil, approximate 12" depth.
- Borrow Excavation (1,400 CY) to a depth of approximately 5', with slopes not exceeding 2:1.
- Construct Temporary Bypass Road for Story Creek Project. (ExhBit "B")
- Remove Temporary Bypass Road & Backfill Borrow Excavation.
- Replace Topsoil to original contours.
