IAA No. C1400161 INTERAGENCY AGREEMENT (IAA)

BETWEEN KITTITAS COUNTY PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENT and THE STATE OF WASHINGTON, DEPARTMENT OF ECOLOGY

THIS INTERAGENCY AGREEMENT is made and entered into by and between the STATE OF WASHINGTON, DEPARTMENT OF ECOLOGY, hereinafter referred to as "ECOLOGY," and the KITTITAS COUNTY PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENT hereinafter referred to as "KCPHD," pursuant to the authority granted by Chapter 39.34 RCW.

THE PURPOSE OF THIS AGREEMENT is to establish an Air Quality Advisory Committee (AQAC), assess the reasons for burning, educate the community in a way that resonates, and reduce the overall PM2.5 "bad air days" in Kittitas County. KCPHD proposes to complete a wood stove inventory, a community survey, and a qualitative assessment to determine the current situation regarding burning and air quality. KCPHD will use the information produced in the assessment, the feedback provided by the AQAC, and research into best practices to develop and implement a plan for outreach and education to reduce PM2.5 in Kittitas County.

THEREFORE, IT IS MUTUALLY AGREED THAT:

1. STATEMENT OF WORK

KCPHD shall furnish the necessary personnel, equipment, material and/or service(s) and otherwise do all things necessary for or incidental to the performance of the work set forth in Appendix A, attached hereto and incorporated herein.

2. PERIOD OF PERFORMANCE

Subject to its other provisions, the period of performance of this IAA shall commence on **January 1, 2014**, or date of execution, whichever comes later, and be completed by **January 1, 2015**, unless terminated sooner as provided herein.

3. PERFORMANCE REPORTING

KCPHD shall submit progress reports to ECOLOGY on a quarterly basis. Quarterly reports shall cover the periods January 1 through March 31, April 1 through June 30, July 1 through September 30, and October 1 through December 31. Reports shall be due within thirty days following the end of the quarter being reported.

4. PAYMENT

Compensation for the work provided in accordance with this IAA has been established under the terms of RCW 39.34.130 and in accordance with Governor's Executive Order 10-07. This is a performance-based contract, in which payment is based on the successful completion of expected deliverables. The parties have determined that the cost of accomplishing the work herein will not exceed \$25,000. Payment for satisfactory performance of the work shall not exceed this amount unless the parties mutually agree to a higher amount. Compensation for services shall be based on the terms set forth in accordance with the tasks listed in Appendix A, Statement of Work and Budget, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein. ECOLOGY will not make payment until it has reviewed and accepted the completed work.

5. BILLING PROCEDURE

KCPHD shall submit invoices to ECOLOGY for payment. All invoices are to be delivered to the attention of Carrol Johnston, at the following address: Department of Ecology, Air Quality Program, PO Box 47600, Olympia, WA 98504-7600.

Invoices may be submitted on a monthly basis or at the completion of the work.

Each invoice shall reference the Agreement (IAA) number and clearly identify the items related to performance under this agreement. All expenses invoiced shall be supported with copies of invoices paid. Upon expiration of the Agreement, any claim for payment not already made shall be submitted within 30 days after the expiration date or the end of the fiscal year, whichever is earlier. Payment will be within 30 days of receipt of properly completed invoice.

Payment for approved and completed work will be issued through Washington State's Department of Enterprise Services Statewide Payee Desk. To receive payment you must register as a state-wide vendor by submitting a state-wide vendor registration form and an IRS W-9 form at website, http://www.des.wa.gov/services/ContractingPurchasing/Business/VendorPay/Pages/default.aspx. If you have questions about the vendor registration process you can contact DES at the Payee Help Desk at (360) 407-8180 or email payeehelpdesk@des.wa.gov.

6. ALTERATIONS AND AMENDMENTS

This Agreement may be amended by mutual agreement of the parties. Such amendments shall not be binding unless they are in writing and signed by personnel authorized to bind each of the parties.

7. SUBCONTRACTORS

KCPHD agrees to take complete responsibility for all actions of any Subcontractor used for the performances under this agreement.

Prior to performance KCPHD shall identify subcontractor(s) who will perform services in fulfillment of agreement requirements, including their name, the nature of services to be performed, address, telephone, WA State Department of Revenue Registration Tax number (UBI), federal tax identification number (TIN), and anticipated dollar value of each subcontract:

8. ASSIGNMENT

The work to be provided under this Agreement, and any claim arising thereunder, is not assignable or delegable by either party in whole or in part, without the express prior written consent of the other party, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld.

9. DISPUTES

In the event that a dispute arises under this Agreement, it shall be determined by a Dispute Board in the following manner: Each party to this Agreement shall appoint one member to the Dispute Board. The members so appointed shall jointly appoint an additional member to the Dispute Board. The Dispute Board shall review the facts, agreement terms and applicable statutes and rules and make a determination of the dispute. The determination of the Dispute Board shall be final and binding on the parties hereto. As an alternative to this process, either of the parties may request intervention by the Governor, as provided by RCW 43.17.330, in which event the Governor's process will control.

10. FUNDING AVAILABILITY

ECOLOGY's ability to make payments is contingent on availability of funding. In the event funding from state, federal, or other sources is withdrawn, reduced, or limited in any way after the effective date and prior to completion or expiration date of this agreement, ECOLOGY, at its sole discretion, may elect to terminate the agreement, in whole or part, for convenience or to renegotiate the agreement subject to new funding limitations and conditions. ECOLOGY may also elect to suspend performance of the agreement until ECOLOGY determines the funding insufficiency is resolved. ECOLOGY may exercise any of these options with no notification restrictions.

11. GOVERNING LAW AND VENUE

This Agreement is entered into pursuant to and under the authority granted by the laws of the state of Washington and any applicable federal laws. The provisions of this Agreement shall be construed to conform to those laws. This Agreement shall be construed and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Washington, and the venue of any action brought hereunder shall be in the Superior Court for Thurston County.

12. INDEPENDENT CAPACITY

The employees or agents of each party who are engaged in the performance of this Agreement shall continue to be employees or agents of that party and shall not be considered for any purpose to be employees or agents of the other party.

13. ORDER OF PRECEDENCE

In the event of an inconsistency in the terms of this Agreement, or between its terms and any applicable statute or rule, the inconsistency shall be resolved by giving precedence in the following order:

- a. Applicable Federal and State of Washington statutes, regulations and rules.
- b. Mutually agreed written amendments to this Contract.
- c. Statement of Work and Budget.
- d. Any other provisions of the Agreement, including materials incorporated by reference.

14. RECORDS MAINTENANCE

The parties to this Agreement shall each maintain books, records, documents and other evidence that sufficiently and properly reflect all direct and indirect costs expended by either party in the performance of the service(s) described herein. These records shall be subject to inspection, review or audit by personnel of both parties, other personnel duly authorized by either party, the Office of the State Auditor, and federal officials so authorized by law. All books, records, documents, and other material relevant to this Agreement will be retained for six years after expiration and the Office of the State Auditor, federal auditors, and any persons duly authorized by the parties shall have full access and the right to examine any of these materials during this period.

Records and other documents, in any medium, furnished by one party to this agreement to the other party, will remain the property of the furnishing party, unless otherwise agreed. The receiving party will not disclose or make available this material to any third parties without first giving notice to the furnishing party

and giving it a reasonable opportunity to respond. Each party will utilize reasonable security procedures and protections to assure that records and documents provided by the other party are not erroneously disclosed to third parties.

15. RIGHTS IN DATA

Unless otherwise provided, data which originates from this Agreement shall be "works for hire" as defined by the U.S. Copyright Act of 1976 and shall be owned by state of Washington. Data shall include, but not be limited to, reports, documents, pamphlets, advertisements, books magazines, surveys, studies, computer programs, films, tapes, and/or sound reproductions. Ownership includes the right to copyright, patent, register, and the ability to transfer these rights.

Both Ecology and KCPHD may use these materials, and permit others to use them, for any purpose consistent with their respective missions as agencies of the State of Washington. Material which KCPHD provides and uses to perform this agreement but which not created for or paid for by Ecology shall be owned by KCPHD or such other party as determined by Copyright Law and/or KCPHD's internal policies.

16. SEVERABILITY

If any provision of this Agreement or any provision of any document incorporated by reference shall be held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the other provisions of this Agreement which can be given effect without the invalid provision, if such remainder conforms to the requirements of applicable law and the fundamental purpose of this agreement, and to this end the provisions of this Agreement are declared to be severable.

17. TERMINATION FOR CAUSE

If for any cause, either party does not fulfill in a timely and proper manner its obligations under this Agreement, or if either party violates any of these terms and conditions, the aggrieved party will give the other party written notice of such failure or violation. The responsible party will be given the opportunity to correct the violation or failure within 15 working days. If failure or violation is not corrected, this Agreement may be terminated immediately by written notice of the aggrieved party to the other.

18. TERMINATION FOR CONVENIENCE

Either party may terminate this Agreement upon thirty (30) days' prior written notification to the other party. If this Agreement is so terminated, the parties shall be liable only for performance rendered or costs incurred in accordance with the terms of this Agreement prior to the effective date of termination

19. WAIVER

A failure by either party to exercise its rights under this Agreement shall not preclude that party from subsequent exercise of such rights and shall not constitute a waiver of any other rights under this Agreement unless stated to be such in a writing signed by an authorized representative of the party and attached to the original Agreement.

20. AGREEMENT MANAGEMENT

The representative for each of the parties shall be responsible for and shall be the contact person for all communications and billings regarding the performance of this Agreement.



D. Proposal Summary:

KCPHD's mission is to protect and promote the health and the environment of the people of Kittitas County. Health impacts from poor air quality in Kittitas County are a concern that falls within that mission. As part of this proposal, KCPHD is seeking to establish an Air Quality Advisory Committee (AQAC), assess patterns of, reasons for, and attitudes about burning, educate the community in a way that resonates, and reduce the overall PM2.5 "bad air days" in Kittitas County. KCPHD proposes to complete a wood stove inventory, a community survey, and a qualitative assessment to determine the current situation regarding burning and air quality. KCPHD will use the information produced in the assessment, the feedback provided by the AQAC, and research into best practices to develop and implement a plan for outreach and education to reduce PM2.5 in Kittitas County. KCPHD has the staff capacity and experience to lead the AQAC and coordinate the project together with our partners. Many of our partnerships are already established, and staff has experience building community around an issue such as air quality. The logic model below demonstrates how our proposal can lead to improved health outcomes from better air quality.



E. Background:

Kittitas County lies along the East slopes of the Cascade Mountain Range. The geography of the county results in long periods of high pressure and air inversions where any smoke emitted into the atmosphere stays in the lower atmosphere until changing conditions clean out the valley. Air quality data from ECOLOGY indicate Ellensburg has one of the highest levels of PM2.5 in Washington State during winter home-heating season. Ellensburg has been identified by ECOLOGY and the State legislature as a vulnerable community for PM 2.5. Over the past few years, fine particle air pollution in the Ellensburg area has reached unhealthy levels several times. This is a concern not only for health reasons, but also because higher levels of fine particles could cause the Ellensburg area to violate the federal health-based air quality standard.

KCPHD has evaluated air monitoring data from ECOLOGY's air monitoring station in Ellensburg, Washington since at least 1999 as an environmental health indicator. In the 2012 Kittitas County Community Health Assessment, poor air quality was identified as an area of concern by a group of key community partners that were gathered to identify and bring focus to concerns affecting the health of the local community. In this assessment, it was also noted that Kittitas County has a significantly higher mortality rate for influenza and pneumonia compared to Washington State as a whole. This statistic draws concern regarding respiratory impacts related to poor air quality.

Currently, KCPHD does not have any funding dedicated to air quality awareness or improvement. When poor air quality conditions exist due to wildfire smoke or air inversions, KCPHD monitors the air quality and sends out multiple media releases and works with local partners such as health care, schools, and daycares to reduce exposure to poor air. KCPHD also participates in the county's Emergency Operations Center, providing emergency personnel with information about current air quality conditions during wildfire events. KCPHD also receives information from ECOLOGY during air inversions, which are distributed to partners throughout the community. Kittitas County Solid Waste posts air quality messages on a public message board at the transfer station.

F. Partnerships:

- Kittitas County Public Health Department (KCPHD) will be the lead agency responsible for facilitating the Air Quality Advisory Committee (AQAC), completing assessments, and creating the outreach and education plan for Kittitas County.
- Washington State Department of Ecology (ECOLOGY) will participate in the AQAC and provide technical assistance to KCPHD as needed.
- Kittitas Valley Fire & Rescue will assist KCPHD by participating in the AQAC, contributing feedback to curriculum development and providing air quality county specific data upon request.
- Kittitas County Fire Marshall will assist KCPHD by participating in the AQAC and contributing to the development of the air quality outreach and education program.
- Kittitas County Solid Waste will assist KCPHD in the assessment process by helping to reach key demographic population. They will also participate in the AQAC and curriculum development.
- HopeSource will assist KCPHD by providing staff to assist with assessment development and implementation. They will also participate in the AQAC and curriculum development.
- Other Partners: KCPHD plans to reach out to other community partners to join the AQAC and/or provide assistance with the project. Examples include: Ellensburg Public Library, Central Washington University, Kittitas Valley Community Hospital, Washington State Department of Health, local woodstove retailers, etc.
