## REVISED WORK PLAN/APPROVED PROJECTS

**2015 Homeland Security Grant (HSGP)  
State Homeland Security Program (SHSP)**

**Agency: KITTITAS COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE**

As the Pass-through Entity (PTE), the Washington State Military Department (WMD) Emergency Management Division's (EMD) Preparedness Grants Section (PGS), referenced as the Department, is responsible for ensuring federal funding is expended and programs implemented in full accordance with governing law and regulations. Eighty-percent of the state's award is allocated to local and tribal units of government in accordance with Federal guidelines. Washington State is divided into nine Homeland Security Regions. Funding is allocated to the Regions according to a county base, population, and population density funding formula. The remaining twenty percent is allocated to state agencies using a sustainment funding model.

Region 7 is vulnerable and faces the risks related to the acts of terrorism and the use of force, or violence against persons, property, government or any segment of the political or social objectives. Region 7 is vulnerable to wildland fire, landslides, floods, winter storms, windstorms, earthquakes, pandemic incidents and the human caused acts of terrorism directed towards, hydroelectric facilities, transportation, public events, and industry. Risks are the expected negative impact of an adverse incident (whether the results of terrorism or natural hazard) considering the magnitude of its impact. Homeland Security Grant Funding will sustain Region 7 capabilities with a functional emergency management program. This investment enhances the planning, training, exercise, and response of the regional responders and volunteers.

Region 7 is composed of Chelan, Douglas, Grant, and Okanogan Counties. The responsibility of the Region 7 Homeland Security Coordinating Office and point of contact for the Region 7 Investment is rotated with each county serving in turn. Region 7 submitted an Investment as part of the Washington State FY15 SHSP Investment Justification. Kittitas County is responsible for the following projects approved as a part of the regional Investment.

<b>PROJECT #1</b>	Emergency Management Storage Unit	\$6,480
<b>DESCRIPTION:</b>	Kittitas County Emergency Management rents a storage unit behind the office to store emergency management equipment to include, generators, mobile lights, Mobile EOC, etc.	
<b>PROJECT #2</b>	SWAT team Training / Emergency Management Training	\$6,000 \$11,523
<b>DESCRIPTION:</b>	<p>The training is for the Kittitas County Special Response Team, KCSRT is a multi-regional team. The training is sponsored by the Washington State Tactical Officers Association. The EM training is to cover travel for the annual WASEMA conference.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Specialized training will be funded under this project for the multi-regional Kittitas County Special Response Team (KCSRT) to include SWAT training sponsored by the Washington State Tactical Officers Association.</li> <li>Funding will also cover professional development to include attendance at the annual WSEMA conference.</li> </ul>	
<b>PROJECT #3</b>	Courthouse security	\$28,848
<b>DESCRIPTION:</b>	The Kittitas County Courthouse houses the Auditor, Assessor, Board of County Commissioners, Treasurer, County IT and the Courts. The doors are controlled by proxy cards. The cards have a picture ID and must be worn by staff at all times. This project would upgrade the door lock to exterior doors having proxy card door locks.	
<b>PROJECT #4</b>	SWAT team medical kit / AED pads	\$1,600
<b>DESCRIPTION:</b>	The Kittitas County Special Response Team is in need of a battlefield expedient medical kit to help trauma patients in the field before victims can be extracted via EMS. Kittitas County is also in need of bulk Automatic External Defibrillator pads. The current emergency stored pads have expired and need replacing.	
<b>PROJECT #5</b>	Cyber Security Authentication equipment	\$1,200
<b>DESCRIPTION:</b>	The security authentication hardware will be installed on all laptops to insure cyber security to prevent theft of information. The authentication hardware will render the laptops useless if they fall into the wrong hands.	
<b>PROJECT #6</b>	Unmanned aircraft	\$6,420
<b>DESCRIPTION:</b>	Small UAV for Search and Rescue operation. The purchase of a Phantom-3 UAV to support Search and Rescue efforts. This will be used to fly down the many rivers in Kittitas County to locate the stranded people or flown on Forest Service trails to locate lost hikers.	

<b>PROJECT #7</b>	Weather Station/Forest Technology System	\$16,080
<b>DESCRIPTION:</b>	In the Saddle Mountain Range area adjacent to the Colockum range, a huge gap exists in available weather information, particularly wind speed and direction and humidity. The weather station is capable of determining wind speed and direction, humidity levels, temperature, and precipitation. The data will be available on a public website and will help with decision-making concerning natural or human-caused (terrorism) wildland fires. It will also help the EOC in determining evacuation strategies and assist the Fire Marshall's Office with data needed to declare burn bans.	
<b>PROJECT #8</b>	SWAT Tactical Pole Camera	\$8,445
<b>DESCRIPTION:</b>	The camera, attached to a telescopic pole capable of extending up to a second story window, has the ability to rotate to view an entire room. Images taken are sent to a monitor for review and can be used for tactical situation decision-making such as when it is safe for personnel to enter a room. The Kittitas County Special Response Team will use the camera to limit exposure to hostile threats, greatly enhancing the safety of the officers.
