Dear Mr. Pickerel:

Regarding the waste disposal alternatives for the proposed Whispering Pines River Resort, our first choice has been to have services provided by the City of Cle Elum. In the event that sewer is not extended, several on-site alternatives can be explored. Our assumption is that the existing soils are very permeable. This will necessitate several design considerations to mitigate this, ie. pressure distribution, mound system, recirculating sand filter, sand lined trenches, etc. Which of the several of the considerations will be used must necessarily wait to be determined when final layouts, sizes, and locations are decided. We do not intend, under any circumstances, to allow improperly treated wastewater effluent to enter the groundwater. We hope this answers some of your questions. Please do not hesitate to contact us.

We have reviewed the Draft Environmental Impact Statement for Whispering Pines River Resort. We have the following comments:

- Page iii: It is mentioned that a Solid Waste Discharge Permit (WAC 173-216) is required. We have never heard of this permit nor the stated regulation.
- Page 8: Future RV sites needs restroom facility access within 200 feet (guideline). This necessitates locating restrooms in the floodway which would not be permitted. The community recreation area is also described as having restrooms. These restrooms also may not be located within the floodway.
- Page 15: The soils are described as being excessively permeable. As stated in the EIS and we wish to strongly reinforce, this concern with excessive permeability will need to be mitigated by close scrutiny of proposed on-site sewage disposal system designs.
- Page 21: An evaluation of the water table level would need to occur in the vicinity of any proposed on-site sewage disposal system locations prior to construction permit issuance.
- Page 25: Additional birds observed in the vicinity of the site should include bald eagles and ospreys.
- Page 27: There may exist some concern with mosquitos associated with the wetland areas.

It is our opinion that this project is probably environmentally satisfactory. Our concerns relative to on-site sewage disposal can be addressed. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact us.

The Yakima Indian Nation would like to comment on the Draft Environmental Impact Statement for the Whispering Pines Resort near Cle Elum. We feel that in general this document does not provide adequate information to access the environmental impacts of this process on fisheries resources of the Yakima River. There are no detailed engineering reports regarding road locations and elevations, septic tank design, fill amounts, or riparian vegetation removal. We have the following specific comments as well:

Alternatives Section: This document discusses a semi-maintained trail, but does not provide details. Does semi-maintained mean that is will be graded every two years? Does this mean new vegetation that overhangs the trail will be removed periodically? Until this is better defined, we cannot make an assessment regarding the impacts associated with trail development. We are concerned about loss of shade, and reduction of terrestrial input to the stream resulting from the loss of riparian vegetation. In addition, there is a discussion of a buffer being provided along clear description of the but there is no river, characteristics of the buffer. The document also states that growth will be dependent on the ability to adapt to natural Who will make that determination, and how will it be conditions. What are the criteria that will be used. This should clearly be described in this document.

Under Section 3, existing conditions, it states" based in part upon the scoping process and preliminary review, the lead agency decides which elements are to be discussed in the We would like to make it clear that there was no proposal. process identified with this proposal. scoping determinations were made solely on the basis of responses to Declaration of No Significance, which provided only the details normally supplied with an environmental checklist. We have additional comments in this section as well.

Soils: The document states that soils in the area are very permeable. We are concerned that oil and gas from the road surfaces, and contaminants from septic tanks will leach through these permeable soils. There is no adequate assessment or information that determines the levels of contamination expected, only that it will be insignificant. There is no data to support this provided. In addition, we find no coding system for the soils map, so we cannot determine what the soils types are. We also find that the topographic map is unreadable. finally, there

are no specific mitigative measures defined.

<u>Water:</u> As stated in the EIS, the slough within the project boundary supports salmonids. As such, we cannot support any fill activity within this area. In addition, it is stated that road runoff will be channelled via swales to the wetlands and slough to act as a "biofiltration" system. This too is unacceptable. There is no information regarding levels of contamination, and introduction of petroleum byproducts will have adverse impacts on fish residing in these areas.

Groundwater: We believe that the analysis of the depth of the water table is inadequate. The observations at the soil log hole were taken during an extremely dry year, and does not provide grounds for making a conclusive determination. We therefore feel that there is not an adequate basis to determine that there is adequate separation between surface and groundwaters, and must therefore assume that there will be comingling of waters. In addition, there is no description of the "modified septic tanks", so we cannot make a determination as to whether there will be groundwater or surface water contamination due to the septic system that will be employed. This issue can only be resolved if there are test wells dug and details of the "modified septic tanks" are provided.

Plants and animals: There are no details provided regarding how many or which trees will be removed, so we cannot assess the impacts of the loss of riparian vegetation. There are also no design specifications regarding the slough crossing. How much fill will be placed, what are the contours of the slough in this area, what size culvert, if any will be placed, and how much manipulation of the banks of the slough will take place. This information must be provided to make an adequate determination of impacts. However, the fact that fish use the slough indicates that any filling of the slough will reduce available habitat, which is unacceptable. We therefore disagree that there would be no impacts to fish due to the filling of the sloughs, loss of vegetation, possible groundwater contamination, and introduction of road wash to the sloughs. Mitigation measures that clearly address these issues must be provided.

<u>Water wells:</u> We would like to see a determination as to whether wells that are drilled will in fact utilize surface waters.

<u>Sewer:</u> As stated previously, an "innovative" system of sewage control must be clearly described, and should be resolved at this stage, rather than for later determination if the project is approved. We have no design plans to determine what this innovative system is, or whether it will be adequate. This material is required in an Environmental Impact Statement.

To summarize, the material provided in this document is not adequate to make a determination as the significance of environmental impacts resulting from this projects. It is clear

that there will be unacceptable impacts from the filling in of portions of the slough area. Inadequate information is provided regarding groundwater and surface water contamination, loss of riparian vegetation, and septic tank specifications. On these grounds, we oppose the approval of this projects. If there is additional information we can provide, please contact Larry Wasserman of my staff at 865-5121.

I have reviewed the environmental impact statement for Whispering Pines River Resort. I would like to comment on the following for the record of this proposal.

A. Process

- Scoping. I am sorry that my offer to help scope this project last year was not taken advantage of. Instead the DEIS soft pedals the issues which are of most concern to me while providing many pages of interesting but not very useful information.
- 2. Public Notice and Hearings. I would appreciate a public involvement section in the Final which gives the dates of publishing of all public notices for this project. I never saw any in the Daily Record and I am afraid that most of the public has not had an opportunity to review the DEIS. For the record however, I was sent and received a copy of the document for which I am grateful.

I don't understand not having a public hearing on the Draft. The purpose of such a hearing is to identify areas which need further work or to correct errors before publishing a final eis. The absence of a hearing and a scoping of the proposal assures a suspect document of little value to decision makers.

B. The Proposal.

1. The Draft on page one states that the proposal is a site plan to be submitted for review for a shorelines permit and a conditional use permit. This is not good enough for a Shorelines Substantial Development Permit. It may be good enough for a conditional use, but I would have to wonder how useful it could be for that process. A site map as project won't work. 2. There is almost a complete absence of specific project information. Will further studies and permits be required for all structures and site work? How wide will the roads be? Where will the culverts go? How much of a buffer from the shoreline will there be?. And so on. If the proponent does not give project specifics then they can avoid specific mitigations in the eis. Not surprisingly an avoidance of mitigation is exactly what we have in this Draft.

C. Alternatives

- 1. What is Alternative 1, Public Campground (page 9), was this a mistake? If not it should be developed more fully.
- 2. Analysis of no action alternative should be more fully developed. In this regard, several times the Draft states that the proposal would be better than residential development of the area, is residential development a "no action" implication? If so please give the basis for this assertion.

D. Shorelines

- 1. The Master Program designates the property Conservancy, what implications does this have for the proposal?
- 2. Where is the ordinary high water mark measured from? E. Density of proposal
 - How much of the site could actually be left in a natural condition with such a high density proposal? The maps give no scale, could the sites shown actually equal 300? This is not clear.
 - 2. How many people would peak usage translate to?

F. Wetlands

- 1. My memory of the site is that the SSE slough is much longer than outlined on the map page 26. The proposal, site map, indicates that development will occur on the eastern portion of the half circle. I would suggest that this development is not appropriate (see attached site map with rough indication of the area of concern.)
- 2. How much wetlands will be lost? How will this be compensated?

G. Habitat

1. The shoreline buffer is clearly inadequate. Both because of the important habitat and the County's Shoreline Master Program which requires a 100' setback for permanent structures. Roads, water system and electrical hook-ups are permanent in my view. I Recommend 100 foot buffer especially on the South and Eastern shoreline of the gravel bar (half circle). This would confine site development to the inside the perimeter of the proposed

road on the site plan map (please see my attached site map.)

2. How much clearing, grubbing, filling, leveling in square acres or cubic yards will be done? This Draft really lacks quantifiable measures.

H. Sewer


- 1. Sewer is a major issue with regard to development of this site. This is especially true with such a high density proposed. What sewer system is proposed? What will its useful life be? Its reliability? Its effectiveness? Its resistance to "midnight fixes"?
- 2. Sewer in this case is an important issue for environmental review. Decision makers and the public deserve full disclosure of the environmental risks and trade-offs.

Both of the preferred alternatives for the Whispering Pines developement would include 6 permanent cabins, 30 full service hook-ups and, at most, 300 temporary R.V. hook-ups. If the figure of 300 units is used as a base, then one may easily assume that, at full capicity, this R.V. park will be the home of six hundred people (figuring a conservative 2 people per R.V.). In paragraph 2, pg. 33, I notice that there are no county guidelines for campground densities, perhaps this might be an idea worth looking into. These 600 hypothetical campers constitute a population 2/3 the size of Roslyn. Roslyn, however, has been required to build a new sewer system with a settling pond etc. engineered to very stringent specifications; Roslyn, also, does not lie within a flood plain.

The opening paragraph on pg. 21 states that no ground water study has been done in the vicinity of the proposed campground, yet on page 35 regarding septic systems: "some type of innovative system" will be required, with close scrutiny by the health department. One wonders whether close scrutiny will continue after after construction and use of these septic systems? Will a ground water study be done afterward, and what would such a study be compared to if no previous study has been done?

Under Impacts on pg. 21 are examples of oil byproducts and chemicals associated with R.V.'s which could enter the soil and ground water; however, this E.I.S. states that "little or no" impact will occur because the only potential

interaction would be during periods of high river elevations. The study also says (pg.2 soils) that xerofluent floodplains flood frequently during the March-June period. And after June, for the remaining summer months, isn't the Yakima River flowing at capacity due to irrigation and/or fisheries? The water table where Whispering Pines is proposed is, at most, 36". Many oil byproducts and chemicals do not readily decompose. One might then reason that R.V. related chemicals will enter the ground water eventually after being held in the soil until "very rapid" permeability occurs when the water level is up.

Water quality should be taken into account when considering the proposed Whispering Pines development. A case could also be made for wildlife, aesthetics, public river access, or cummulative effects in riparian zones as well. Rivers are beautiful, with more diverse plant and animal life than other areas — special care is necessary.

Please consider: lower density; mandatory dumping of R.V. waste in contained, pumpable tanks upon entering the campground (thus reducing the quantity that the Whispering Pines system will have to handle, and also reducing the dumping of waste at temporary sites); a different location.

Dear Pex:

Thank you for arranging the meeting on the project site with Mr. Rogalski, Mr. Wallgren and yourself. I believe that we all now have a better idea of the project and wetland concerns.

It is my understanding that you will now prepare a map (or maps) of the site with overlays showing 1) the location and extent of wetlands, 2) existing vegetation, and 3) planned developments including roads, culverts, campsites and other hardened areas, structures, utilities and areas where vegetation will be modified (i.e. landscaped areas, lawns, recreation areas, etc.).

You indicated that the site plan will be designed such that there will be no net loss of wetlands. Mr. Rogalski also affirmed that there would be no filling or development of the wet areas. We discussed that it may be advantageous to encroach into some wetland areas in some instances, for example when multiple benefits could be achieved (e.g. both improved road alignment and more usable wildlife habitat, etc.). However we agreed that such encroachment would be minor and that any loss of wetlands would be fully replaced elsewhere on the site. We also talked about the possibility of enhancing or restoring some of the wetland areas and I indicated that the Department of Wildlife would generally support such proposals.

As we discussed, wetland delineation in river bar areas can be difficult because of soils do not necessarily provide a third criterion. It is my opinion that most areas of the site with wetland plants do indeed exhibit wetland hydrology, though it may be necessary to visit the site during a high river stage to observe it. I have enclosed some pages from the new delineation manual and highlighted some concerns. Please

keep copies of the data you collect and use in making your delineations. I would like to review these data, and for my own edification perhaps visit some of the more difficult wetland sites with the Department's Wetland Biologist, Bob Zeigler. Field review would, of course, be coordinated with you and Mr. Rogalski.


