If they are not present (night shift), they see the new intakes first thing the next business day to complete their assessments. This has decreased the potential of someone needing immediate medical or behavioral helath services as well as started our reentry services and treatment at the time of intake.							

Increase necessary follow up care for those who are being released from Kittitas County Jail with behavioral health disorders.	Develop a working process for ensuring those who are released have a handoff and are prepared to continue with any necessary treatment upon release from Kittitas County Jail.	Implementing this program, with others, has allowed us to increase our reentry services and really starts when the person is booked. There is constant communication between all programs and staff to ensure that everyone who is leaving have the appropriate information to help with a better handoff to our community or where the individual is returning to.							
	Follow up on any specific care navigation required to ensure client is aware of assistance and aware of any appointments made.	This is a coordinated care through our staff, contracted and employed, that includes medical, mental/behavioral health, MOUD/MAUD (Medication for Opioid Use Disorder or Medication for Alcohol Use Disorder), Medicaid, and other basic needs.							
Develop working relationship with all other programming at Kittitas County Jail as well as any navigators for clients.	Get a working knowledge of other programs within Kittitas County Jail.	There is continual communication and discussions between all services and programs available at KCJ (Kittitas County Jail). <p>Develop a system for medicated and therapeutic treatment for those with co-occurring disorders.</p>	<p>Design and implement plans for re-entry services and follow-up for those being released prior to their release</p>	<p>With KCJ going live with the 1115 waiver for Medicaid, there is now a collaborative effort to assist the client for reentry as well as handing them off, if eligible, to their MCOs (Managed Care Organization like Molina, Wellpath, United, etc.) for further follow up. The 1115 waiver initiative is a federally funded program through the Washington Healthcare Authority to offer full Medicaid services to those incarcerated the first 90 days, as well as pre-release 90 days to help increase continuation of care, release planning, and a warm handoff. This is for those who would normally be Medicaid eligible in the state of Washington.</p>
