ABOUT THE AUDIT

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of Kittitas County for January 1, 2008, through December 31, 2008.

We evaluated internal controls and performed audit procedures on the activities of the County. We also determined whether the County complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of noncompliance, misappropriation or misuse. The following areas were examined during this audit:

We audit the County every year. The past six audits of the County have reported some areas of concern. We issued one finding each in 2002, 2003 and 2004 regarding internal controls at the Treasurer's Office. Those findings have been resolved.

We issued findings in 2006 and 2007 relating to the lack of internal controls over the preparation of the financial statements, which we are repeating for the 2008 financial statement audit.
